GOOD PLACES TO WRITE AND DRAW

Cricket's Creamery and Café and 19th Street Shopping District

I have to fess up—I'm a coffee girl. The visit to the tea house just didn't feel right to me, so I am returning to familiar grounds. This month brings me to the charming Heights 19th Street shopping district and Cricket's Creamery. I have lived in the Heights for 13 years and during that time have observed the evolution of 19th Street. When I first moved here, the funky Kaldi Café held court where the classy Shade now stands. I loved Kaldi and spent many breakfasts there sharing the trials and tribulations of life with my best friend Amy. I mourned the closing of Kaldi for months and still hold a baseless grudge against Shade for occupying its former building. Although there have been changes, many of the same shops from that time are still around like Casa Ramirez and Venus Hair along with great new additions like Sew Crafty, the Lift, and 18 Hands Gallery.

As someone whose day job involves staring at a wall and computer screen in a windowless room while trying to write creative and wildly persuasive grant proposals, I am the first to acknowledge that writers need excitement! Furthermore, we need interesting things to look at. The same goes for artists. Cricket's Creamery and 19th Street has everything you need in the way of visual and auditory stimulation to get your creative juices flowing.

General Atmosphere: Cricket's is a sweet, homey, "old school" eatery, which is a nice counterpoint to the many hipster joints in the Heights. It reminds me of the old timey soda fountains you find in small towns throughout Texas. The décor is red, bright pastels, and black and white checkerboard with lots of natural light. I love everything about this place except for the background music. I'm a person who has a hard time tuning things out, especially things that I find annoying or grating. At Cricket's the station is tuned to Sunny 99.9 which means in between the not so great music, you are subjected to a good ten minutes of loud commercials. My advice is to bring the iPod rather than let this minor annoyance stop you from visiting.

Features: Cricket's has several booths, tables, a couch, an adults-only window seating area, and outside seating on 19th Street. My favorite part of visiting Cricket's is the people watching. While Houston does have a few non-mall shopping centers, 19th Street is a destination where people take out-of-towners to show them that Houston is a really cool place no matter what they have heard. From the window seat or patio, there is people-watching galore that is guaranteed to spark your imagination.



Coffee and Comestibles: Cricket's serves a full breakfast and lunch menu featuring many vegetarian and vegan choices. They also have a full range of coffee drinks, soda, and teas. If you want a treat after a long day of writing, drawing or creating, they have a variety of delicious gelatos and sorbetto. I can personally vouch for the yummy pumpkin latte and the gelato.

When to Go: I have been to Cricket's during weekday mornings and it is usually deserted, which is a shame. During my most recent visit, I was pleased to see two other people working on their laptops. Weekends are their busiest times, so if you need solitude to work, stick to weekdays. However, weekends are a great time to sketch the scene.

The Verdict: I like Cricket's Creamery a lot. It has the potential to be a great place to write and draw with a few tweaks. Add a few more people and change the soundtrack and Cricket's Creamery is perfect. I promise you, it's much better than staring at a wall.
